You've *heard* about it - there's a new Library/Community Center coming to Pamlico County. But what do you really *know* about it? .

#### Where will it be?

The new building will be located at the site of the old Hardy's fast food place on Highway 55 in Alliance. You can't miss the bright new sign out front!

#### What's in the plan?

Advanced internet stations, a creative reading room for kids and a dedicated space for teens to hang out. Private meeting rooms and a modern auditorium to engage the general public, and quiet relaxation areas offer places to chill while you enjoy your favorite book.

#### Why is it important?

Communities with modern libraries have higher real estate values. Kids with access to well equipped libraries have higher grade points and graduate in greater numbers. Businesses operating nearby experience increased revenues. Job-seekers discover better employment opportunities with access to vital resources. And so much more!

#### Where do things stand?

Thanks to the work of the Friends of the Pamlico County Library \$2 million dollars have been raised. \$1.5 million came from a grant from the State of NC. FOL president, Bonnie Cap, estimates another \$1 million is needed for completion.

#### When will it be built?

The sooner FOL raises the remaining funds, the sooner they can break ground! What can you do to help?
