After a year of intense research, they formed Neuse Neighbors Network. Jayne was persuaded to accept the role of President for the fledgling organization, an undertaking that would require establishing operational policies, building data bases, creating digital platforms, training volunteers, and of course, attracting members. Although Jayne would be quick to insist that she could not have done all this without a team of dedicated supporters, it is her countless hours of hard work, unfailing good humor and gift for gentle persuasion that made NNN the strong, financially stable organization it is today. As of 2023, NNN has grown to include 140 members and 100 volunteers. She also oversaw the launch of NNN's Sponsorship program, providing financial assistance to deserving neighbors who need a little help paying membership dues. Our community is better off, thanks to Jayne's relentless commitment. For those of us who had the privilege of working with her these past four years, we treasure the friendships we forged.
